It is a gift to have our 2023 Woman of the Year, Judy Humbert, present our program for February. Judy's presentation is titled: Worthy Black Women of Winchester. The title made me think of a Winchester book by Mike Foreman called Some Worthy Women of Winchester. In this collection of mini biographies of 127 women who played prominent roles in the development of Winchester and Frederick County, only 6 black women were included, less than 5%. Judy is going to help us expand the base and the knowledge of worthy women of Winchester which will include some personal stories. I hope you are as eager as am I to attend this presentation by someone I consider a Worthy Woman of Winchester.

After the presentation, there will be a luncheon where the program is taking place. You will have a choice of an entrée: baked chicken or bar-b-que chicken or fried pork chops. Leap Day

A strange amazing day that comes only once every four years. A day of temporal tune up! Vera Nazarian

When I was in college, my small circle of friends and I always celebrated birthdays with cake and sharing the cost of a carnation or two and card. During our sophomore year we "went all out" for one friend: dinner at a restaurant, gifts, decorations, balloons, hats, favors, games and more. She was a "Leapling", born on February 29, and it was her 5th birthday. Most years, she celebrates on February 28 or March 1 but once every four years, she has an actual birthday. Later this month, she will celebrate her 72nd year on earth, but it will only be her 18th birthday.

The extra Leap Day tacked on to February every fourth year is a subtle admission that even something as simple as a calendar can be more complicated than we think. While the modern Gregorian calendar contains 365 days, the actual time it takes for Earth to orbit its star is slightly longer—roughly 365.2421 days. To ensure consistency with the true astronomical year, it is necessary to periodically add in an extra day (and even less often a few minutes) to make up the lost time.

Over the years, I've heard of many different customs or legends associated with Leap Day. Traditionally in Ireland and Britain, women may propose marriage only in leap years. In Finland, tradition is that if a man refuses a woman's proposal on leap day, he should buy her the fabrics for a skirt. But, in Greece, marriage in a leap year is considered unlucky. Since 1980, the French a satirical newspaper titled *La Bougie du Sapeur* (The Sapper's Candle?) is published only on leap year, on 29 February.

But I seldom see any mention that the extra day in a Leap Year might be a blessing; a day to rest and reflect, a day to catch up, a or day to celebrate birthdays. For most of us, it's just another day.

This year, Leap Day gives us an extra day to celebrate two months important to the mission of AAUW.

Our regular Branch Meeting will be on Saturday, February 10, at 10:00 am. To celebrate Black History Month, we will be meeting at T-Bone's Bar and Grill Restaurant, 567 N. Kent Street. After a BRIEF business meeting, our 2023 Woman of the Year Recipient, Judy Humbert, will give a presentation on Worthy Black Women of Winchester. This will be followed by a specially prepared (optional) luncheon. Details about the program and making reservations for lunch are in a separate article.

Our Book Group selection for February is **1619 Project**, by Nikole Hannah-Jones (Editor). We will be meeting via Zoom on February 19, at 6:00 p.m.

On Leap Day itself, Thursday, February 29, at 6:00 p.m. in the Handley Library Auditorium, our branch will be celebrating both Black History Month and Woman's History Month with the Winchester Chapter of NAACP. This is the first time our two organizations have worked together on a joint activity and our team is very excited. We hope that every member will make a special effort to attend and invite others as well.

In March, we will celebrate Woman's History Month with our annual **Woman or the Year** reception. This year we will be honoring **Shelly Lee** at the Godfrey Miller Center Pavilion on **Friday, March 22**, at 6:00 pm.

These are important and interesting events and we hope that each of you will make an effort to attend. Use that extra LEAP Day to LEAP out of your easy chair and find the time to LEAP to each of these events.

"The New York Times Magazine's award-winning "1619 Project" issue reframed our understanding of American history by placing slavery and its continuing legacy at the center of our national narrative. This new book substantially expands on that work, weaving together eighteen essays that explore the legacy of slavery in presentday America with thirty-six poems and works of fiction that illuminate key moments of oppression, struggle, and resistance. The essays show how the inheritance of 1619 reaches into every part of contemporary American society, from politics, music, diet, traffic, and citizenship to capitalism, religion, and our democracy itself."

Did You Know?

<u>Sherry Lloyd</u>

Esther Howland was the first manufacturer of Valentine's cards. She commercialized them and became known as the "Mother of the American Valentine". Valentines in early America were more comical and could even be insulting.

In England, cards were thoughtful, sweet, and expensive. In the 1870s, she decided to make cards like these, and they sold when her brother showed samples to potential clients. She set up a miniature assembly line in her family home and with a crew of local girls assembled 3-D cards with gilded lace and wafer paper. People could now visualize the meaning of "I love you". Her cards ranged in price from five cents to many dollars. In the 1850s she made \$100,000 a year which would be over three million dollars today. These expressions of love continue today due to Esther Howland.

Amy Parker Endowed Scholarship

This year, the Parker Scholarship (in the amount of \$1,425.96) has been awarded to *Amber Keeling*, a master's student in the Professional Studies Certificate Program in Administration and Supervision (PSC) at Shenandoah University. The students in this program have a master's degree already and are enhancing their degrees with advanced qualifications.

Amber is an Elementary School Reading Specialist for McAuliffe Elementary School in Prince William County VA. She has been a teacher for 22 years, 18 years as a Reading Specialist. In her application essay, she wrote, "I have taught in both New York State and Virginia. I have loved being a Reading Specialist. One thing that I love about this role is helping both students and teachers. It goes without saying that helping struggling readers and writers to improve their skills and catch up to their peers is very rewarding. I also love to help teachers. As a Reading Specialist, I am a teacher of teachers.... Continuing to grow and learn and help other teachers do the same is where I see my administration degree taking me."

In her acceptance email, Amber said, "I am so honored to accept the scholarship! Believe it or not, this is the first financial award (scholarship or aid) that I have ever received. This brings tears to my eyes, I am so happy!"

The Parker Scholarship is alternated between doctoral and master's level students at Shenandoah University's Division of Education each year; last year the scholarship went to an EdD student. Graduate students in SU's Education program do not receive any financial assistance; the AAUW Parker Scholarship is the only award offered to them.

Northwest District Meeting Highlights <u>Tess Thome</u>

We had four of our members attend the Zoom Meeting for the Northwest District on January 6, 2024: **Becky Bronson, Theresa Merkel, Belinda Pugh,** and **Tess Thome**.

The State representative for our District moves around to the different branches in our District and it is the Winchester Branch's turn to appoint a District Representative from our Branch. The District Representative is a VA State Board position, so attendance at state board meetings and other state board functions would be required should you elect to be the District Representative.

There was a lot of discussion on the increase in National Dues due to the increased cost of doing business. One of the paths of this discussion was about the fact that for some Grants our organization would be denied since it is considered "Non-Inclusive". This is due to the "university" requirement even though there can be an exception to that "requirement". But there was talk of trying to educate the membership better. It was mentioned at one point there has been discussion over the years to change the name to "American Association of United Women".

The main reason this was being discussed was based on the inability to "be awarded" or "even apply" to grants for many of the causes that are part of our mission.

There was discussion about Lobby Day on January 31st and the fact that we have 66 Legislators this year and they were invited to a function the day before Lobby Day for the first time in 4 years.

There are plans in the works to try to get a Central Atlantic Regional meeting together with 9 regions.

A STEM event is being planned for mostly high school students but due to our busy spring schedule we are not going to participate as a branch due to time constraints.
