What is March?

When it was time for me to sit down and write a message for March, I could think of was that we are "marching into March", which wasn't much of an inspiration. I then began to think of all the different ways we use the word "march" and how many of them apply to our March activities.

Obviously, March is the third month of the year, considered the first month of spring in the northern hemisphere: *The name references Mars, the Roman god of war.*

Marching often refers to the movement of groups of soldiers, perhaps also in reference to Mars: *Enemy troops marched on the city*

Marching is defined as the regular and organized way to walk, not necessarily in a military operation. Many of us think of "eight to the five" or "six to the five" when told to march: *The band marched onto the field*

A march refers to a piece of music with a strong regular beat that is written to be played while people are marching: Who doesn't love a good Sousa march?

A march can be a group of people who are protesting



or supporting something:
Demonstrators marched on City
Hall to celebrate International
Woman's Day.

To march can mean to walk quickly in a direct and forceful way: *She marched into the office and demanded a raise*.

Marching can cause or force (a person) to walk somewhere: We marched the children off to bed.

Marching can mean to continue onward: *Time marches on*.

A march is more than music; it refers to border region or an area with common borders: The region marches with Canada in the north. Primarily in England, to march means to get ahead of or win an advantage in an unexpected and clever way: He stole a march on his competitors by being the first to put the product on the market.

As we march into March, consider all the different ways we can march together supporting the mission of AAUW, our local community and the activities of our own branch: March Forth to the polls and VOTE on March 5, if not before; honor a special woman you know on March 8, International Women's Day; Enjoy some cookies on March 12, National Girl Scout Day, or a slice of pie on March 14, National Pi Day. Heed the words of Shakespeare's soothsayer and beware of the Ides of March on March 15; wear your green and dance a jig (or march to your favorite march) on March 17; recognize Shelly Lee at our Woman of the Year Reception on March 22 (after letting Marsha Gochenour know what dish you will bring); join the Book Group on March 18, as they continue their discussion of 1619; have dinner with some Classy Ladies on March 25 and don't forget to set your clocks ahead on March 10 (Spring Forward).



The 1619 Project by Nikole Hannah-Jones (Editor)

"The New York Times Magazine's award-winning "1619 Project" issue reframed our understanding of American history by placing slavery and its continuing legacy at the center of our national narrative. This new book substantially expands on that work, weaving together eighteen essays that explore the legacy of slavery in presentday America with thirty-six poems and works of fiction that illuminate key moments of oppression, struggle, and resistance. The essays show how the inheritance of 1619 reaches into every part of contemporary American society, from politics, music, diet, traffic, and citizenship to capitalism, religion, and our democracy itself."

Did You Know?

On March 17th we may wear green, purchase shamrocks, plus enjoy Irish foods and parades as we celebrate traditions brought to this country by Irish immigrants.



There are also many women who not only shaped Ireland's history, but who also influenced the world. Some of these famous women include Edith Anne Stoney (1869-1938), Mary Robinson (1944-present), Katie Taylor (1986-present), Sybil Connolly (1921-1998), and Maureen O'Hara (1920-2015).

Edith Anne Stoney was the first woman medical physicist who completed her studies at Newham College Cambridge. She was not awarded a degree because in 1893, Cambridge did not award degrees to women. Fifty years later, they did. Edith was active in the women's suffrage movement. She was the first treasurer of the British Federation of University Women. She also pioneered the use of x-rays in the diagnosis of gas gangrene.

Mary Robinson has been a lawyer, politician, and diplomat. She served as the first female president of Ireland. During her career, she promoted human rights and founded Realizing Rights. The United States awarded her the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

Katie Taylor was born in Bray, Ireland. She is a world class boxer and former soccer player. She has won five consecutive gold medals in Women's World Championships and been a super lightweight Champion since 2023.

Sybil Connolly was an Irish fashion designer who dressed Jackie Kennedy, Julie Andrews, and Elizabeth Taylor. She introduced the world to the use of Irish fabrics with her contributions to Harper's Bazaar and Life magazines. These Irish fabrics included linen, lace, tweed, plus lace and crochet. She never married because she preferred to buy her own mink and diamonds.

Perhaps the most famous Irish actress born in Dublin was Maureen O'Hara. Her career spanned 75 years and she starred in over 60 motion pictures. She was known as the Queen of Technicolor because of her fiery characters and flame-red hair. She first appeared as Esmeralda in The Hunchback of Notre Dame. Other motion pictures include Miracle on 34th Street, The Quiet Man, McClintock!, The Parent Trap, Mr. Hobbs Takes A Vacation, and Only The Lonely. She was the first female action star who performed many of her own stunts and sword fighting. In 2005, she was named Irish American of the Year. In 2011, she was inducted into the Irish American Hall of Fame. She also received an Honorary Oscar in 2014.
